

# Kurth Regional Kiln Park Picnic Ground

Kurth Kiln Picnic Ground lies in a quiet, peaceful bushland setting at the heart of the 3,500ha Kurth Kiln Regional Park, just 7km north of Gembrook. A beautiful place, where well preserved historic old buildings reflect serenely in the pond. Here the wind moves through tall, majestic eucalypt trees while black cockatoos sail majestically overhead.



There are many walking tracks through the forest, such as the Tomahawk Creek Track with its rustic bridge crossing the creek. As the sun filters through the trees, dew drops glisten



golden on the leaves, wildflowers bloom in all delicate shades of the rainbow, birds sing in the trees and sparkling water plummet over the stones, you feel at home with the environment and become part of nature.

Another track along the Tomahawk Creek is the Thornton Track winding past the remnants of the old Carstein Mill, with six Interpretation Panels highlighting points of the waterway, the flora and fauna, the historic relevance of the Kurth Kiln area and the beauty and the biological sensitivity of the Victorian waterways environment.

Kurth Kiln Regional Park and its Picnic Ground is an ideal spot for a picnic, or for camping in one of the many dedicated locations, for bushwalking and exploring the registered cultural heritage site, or to just relax and enjoy the invigorating bushland atmosphere.
